Next SNAP Training... September 22nd!

Where were you during the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake? Where will you be when the next one strikes?
According to a Uniform California Earthquake Rupture Forecast study, California has more than a 99% chance of having a magnitude 6.7 or larger earthquake within the next 30 years and the probability of it happening in the Bay Area is 63%. It's never a bad idea to be prepared for an earthquake!

Sunnyvale Department of Safety offers a FREE emergency preparedness program, SNAP (Sunnyvale Neighborhoods Actively Prepared); the next session starts Thursday, September 22nd. I recently finished the 7-week program in May and highly recommend it to our neighbors. It covers a wide range of information from how to put together a "Go" Bag, safe water storage and filtration, utilities safety, and what public resources are available during and after a disaster. Did you know PG&E will come out to lubricate your gas valve for free and teach you how to turn it off? Do you have an emergency plan for your pets, since Red Cross disaster shelters do not accept them? SNAP also offers hands-on practice in first aid and fire suppression, including learning how to use a fire extinguisher. The best part is meeting other Sunnyvale residents and, on graduation day, getting to team up for a full day's exercise using all the skills vou've learned.


